The objectives and purposes of the organization are to preserve and protect the unique environment of the Fulton Chain of Lakes and surrounding woodlands. Interests of members are considered so that the beauty and natural resources will be kept healthy and desirable.

The goal of pure water through dye testing of septic systems and testing of lake water for bacteria, heads our list. We also work to preserve and protect fish, wildlife, and forests in the area. We promote safe, sensible and fair use of our lakes for navigational purposes.

What is the F.C.L.A.?

NYS Law Operating Certificates

New York law requires boaters under 18 years of age either to be accompanied by an adult or, if between 10 and 18, to have obtained a safety certificate from an approved boater's safety course.

Personal Watercraft

Operators of PWC (Personal Watercraft) must operate their vessel in a reasonable and prudent manner. Weaving through traffic, wake jumping and following another vessel closely, shall constitute reckless operation.

To operate a PWC, persons between the ages of 10-14 must have earned a boater safety certificate and MUST be accompanied by a person 18 years of age or older who has completed the boater safety course.

In addition to the Chain of Lakes 5 mph speed limit within 200' of the shoreline (Sixth & Seventh Lakes 100'), New York State law requires a speed limit of 10 mph within 500' of any designated bathing area.

Reminder

- All persons while operating personal watercraft **MUST** have a Boater Safety Certificate available for inspection. Our Sheriffs suggest having a copy of the original certificate in a zip lock bag.
- Herkimer County Sheriffs **WILL BE** patrolling the lakes on a regular basis, enforcing all the laws pertaining to watercraft operations.

Noise Level

- 82-86 decibels (noisy vessels are ticketed)

Local Law

Effective Only in Town of Webb

Use or operation of personal watercraft and specialty prop-craft is permitted only between the hours of 9:00 am and 6:00 pm daily.

Always wear a vest-type life preserver. Must have a spotter in the boat over age 10, when towing a tube, skier or other device.

Water Skiers & Tubers

- Have a flotation device for each person on board.
- Know location of horn whistle, anchor, and fire extinguisher.
- Use running lights between dusk and dawn.
- Visual distress equipment - State law requires all motorboats, 18 ft. and greater in length, operating on protected (state) waters, to carry a distress flag and three hand held type flares.

Alcohol/Drugs Boating While Intoxicated

A new state law has toughened the penalties for boating while intoxicated (BWI) so that they generally parallel those for driving while intoxicated (DWI). Under the new law, boat operators suspected of being drunk would be forced to take a breathalyzer test or face a \$200 fine and suspension of boating privileges for six months. The penalties for conviction vary according to the circumstances but can include one or more of the following:

- Fines
- Imprisonment
- Loss of boating privileges
- Revocation of boat registration
- Enrollment in a boating safety course

New penalties have also been established for those who operate a boat while the privilege has been suspended.

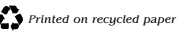

The Story of Our Lake Waters

The Fulton "Chain of Lakes" is part of a river system originally dammed at Old Forge in about 1798. Water flowing through the Fulton Chain starting at Eighth Lake enters the Middle Branch of the Moose River at the Old Forge Dam. The North Branch of the Moose River joins the Middle Branch below the dam. The river then flows past the town of Lyons Falls to the Black River, northwest to Carthage, then on to Watertown, and finally into the Black River Bay on Lake Ontario.

The present dam at Old Forge holds back 6.8 billion gallons of water. This reservoir is managed by the HR-BR Regulating District. In the late 1800's, the State Water Power Commissioner made an agreement with Fulton Chain cottage owners and recreational users to maintain the water level during the summer season, an agreement still in effect.

The lower Fulton Chain starts at Old Forge Pond, travels the 1 mile channel or "Narrows" to First Lake then to Second and Third, through a channel to Fourth Lake then 7 miles to the towns of Eagle Bay and Inlet - a 14 mile trip. The Chain continues through to Fifth Lake, from there one must portage their boat to Sixth and Seventh Lakes, which are navigable from one to the other. Eighth Lake is accessible once again by portage only.

Please, as you use the lakes, be respectful of the environment and help us continue to keep our waters clean. We hope you will enjoy these waters and that you will find this region of the Adirondacks a special part of our world.

- Drive at a safe speed.

- Please do not litter our islands or shorelines. If you bring it in - take it out with you!
- Discharge holding tanks into the lake!

 - Dump garbage or refuse into the lake, its ground.

 - Use water for drinking and cooking.
- The Fulton Chain Lakes is protected by law. The water is used for drinking and cooking.

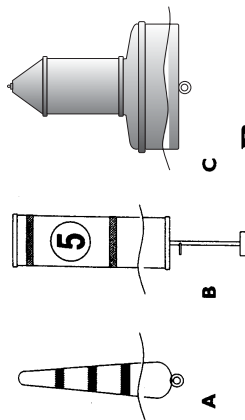

State Law Requires Every Child

- And if you fall in the water, stay with the boat.
- Whenever water conditions or weather cause concern, have everyone aboard wear a PFD.
- They must be ready to use in an emergency.
- Never leave PFDs sealed in plastic wrapping.
- Wear a Coast Guard approved Personal Flotation Device that fits well; make sure it is properly type and approved for your specific usage. Actually put it on, adjust it and test it in the water, so you'll know how it will feel when needed. Do the same for all family members - especially children. Knowing what to expect in the water can prevent panic. Non-swimmers should wear a PFD on any boat.

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Life Jackets (PFDs) The Choice is Yours



Buoys

A - White w/Orange Stripes - marks HAZARDS - two or more white buoys parallel to shore mark a HAZARD AREA - stay on the LAKE SIDE OF BUOYS.

B - Orange/white - 5 mph areas and/or obstructions - BEWARE.

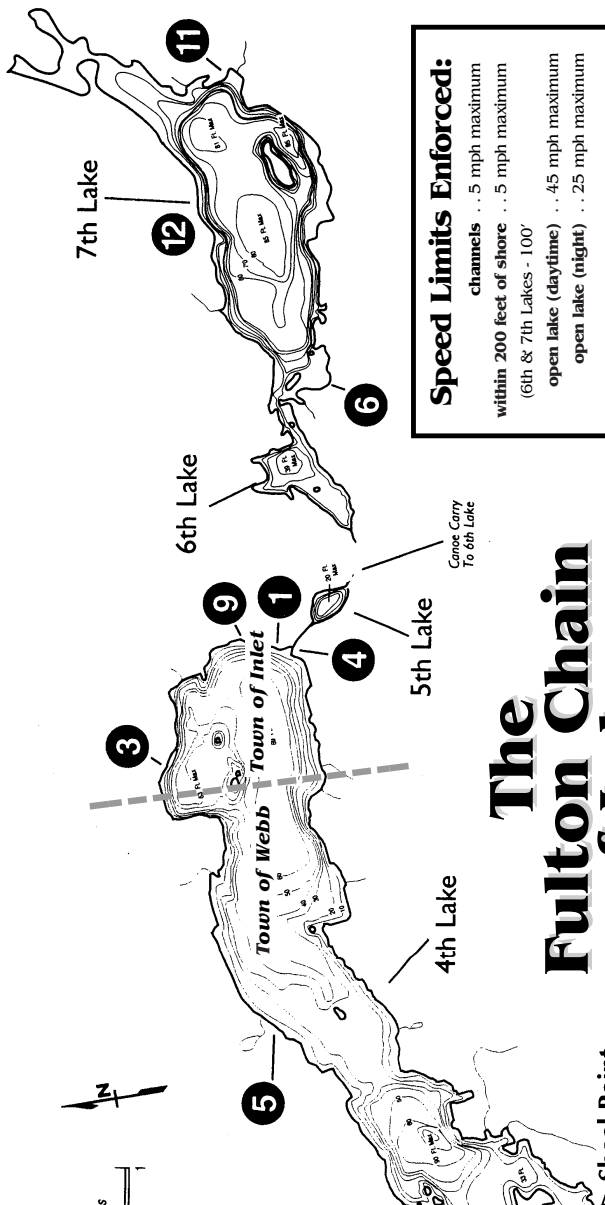
C - Red and Green "Stay Between" mark channel entrance and exit.

Right of Way

- In crossing situations the boat on the starboard (right) has the right of way.
- A boat being overtaken by another boat has the right of way.
- Sailboats/Windsurfers under sail and boats, canoes & kayaks being rowed or paddles have the right of way.

Be Courteous of Others

- Provide a Flotation Device for each person on board at all times.
- Know where all safety items are located on the craft; anchor, whistle/horn, fire extinguisher (I/O).

 channels . . . 5 mph maximum
 within 200 feet of shore . . . 5 mph maximum
 (6th & 7th Lakes - 100'
 open lake (daytime) . . . 45 mph maximum
 open lake (night) . . . 25 mph maximum

Lake Features:

Open Lakes - stay at least 200 feet from shore.

Channels - stay in the center of the channel, but to the right of on-coming boats.

Fishing

There is excellent fishing on the Fulton Chain of Lakes. Bass, trout, salmon and panfish are abundant. A NY State fishing license is required for all persons over 16.
